# L.A. ZONE COMMANDER'S REPORT MARCH 10<sup>TH</sup>, 2019

Head Table Guests and Comrades All:

Good Afternoon, I am pleased to submit my report on behalf of the Ladies Auxiliary Zone G-6.

I attended the Ladies Auxiliary Ontario Command Convention held in Frankford last September representing Zone G6. Six auxiliaries were represented from our Zone. There were 37 Zone Commanders in attendance. The province is divided into 9 districts, consisting of 243 auxiliaries, having a total membership of 8,623 of which 1,254 are life members. In the past year the ladies auxiliaries have raised a total of \$5,900,957.87 and spent a total of \$5,727,755.84. Ontario Command is quite pleased that we have not spent more than we brought in. Most of the auxiliaries are struggling and in the past 2 years we have lost 15 Auxiliaries and 500 members. If this pattern keeps up there will be no Ladies Auxiliary across Ontario so we need to have a recruiting program, if each person can bring in one new member we will be in fine shape.

The Leave the Streets Behind program: we have 644 veterans out of which there are 60 females in 136 communities. Since this inception, over \$3 Million dollars have been raised.

There is now a new program which is Service Dogs for Veterans suffering from PTSD. The new Ontario Command Officers are: President Debbie Olmstead; 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President Kathy Moggy; 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President Sharon Crown; 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice President Kathey Putnam; Chairman Brenda Deacon and Kelly Scott is the new Sports Officer.

Zone G6 Sports Officer Tricia Madore resigned and Comrade Luanne Warren from Almonte stepped in to take her place.

I have made all my Official Visits last fall expect one in December due to my husband's illness. My Deputy Zone Commander filled in for me. We found that most auxiliaries are getting along with their branch but some are experiencing interference from them. We hope that all will be sorted out. We have one auxiliary with only 6 members, but they are keeping up by having card games once a week.

At this time I would like to thank everyone that attended Eric's wake and funeral and also sent cards and donations.

Good Day Comrades,

It is a pleasure to be here representing the Branch Poppy Chairs. I am now into my  $2^{nd}$  year as the Zone G6 Poppy Chairman and still enjoying it. The role has been interesting, and it's been fun working with the Branches this year. However, I have one regret, that there is just not enough time in the day to provide the Branches the support they deserve.

The Poppy Inspections got off to an early start last year with the first inspection completed on Oct 4, with six more being completed in early December 2018 and a final one in January 2019. Although the process was much better than the previous year there was still some confusion regarding how to fill out the requested forms. General observations indicate that those who were having difficulties either did not attend the Poppy training seminar last fall or did not take the time to read the instructions provided. Other than that, there were the usual challenges of scheduling and coordinating visits with the stakeholders. I 'Thank' all the Branches for their cooperation and patience in this exercise and their help in completing the Branch Poppy Trust Fund Inspections and providing the revenue numbers needed for this report.

As for the Poppy campaign last year, I am pleased to report that the Branches were able pull through once again and to make it another successful year for Zone G6. Even with the challenges experienced recruiting sitters for various locations most Branches exceed their revenues as compared to the previous year. With the Branch numbers not all up to-date from the 2018 – 2019 campaign results, I am forecasting that we will be reporting an additional \$5K, possibly more to last year's campaign revenues.

#### Branch 95 Report – March 2019

In September we witnessed the arrival of our LAV III. On 7<sup>th</sup> September Keith Anderson and I were interviewed by the Ottawa Citizen for an article regarding the LAV III Afghanistan Veterans memorial. On 10<sup>th</sup> September we had our annual Zone Commanders inspection. Thanks to our Financial Review Commirrww for their comprehensive report and recommendations that the Branch followed up on, we passed the inspection without any observations. Our big event of the month was the dedication of our Afghan Veterans memorial on 16<sup>th</sup> September that was attended by 18 Afghanistan Veterans plus a large contingent of the Veterans Motor Cycle club. On the same day we moved to Centennial Park to rededicate the main Cenotaph by adding three WWI names to the monument. Following we returned to the Branch to enjoy a lunch and view a WWI exhibit from the National Museum on loan from the Toronto Museum. At the end of September we hosted the District V.S.O. A total of over 300 wreaths and crosses were layed. Also in November I accepted the resignation of our 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice due to health problems. The 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice was elevated to 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice and I appointed Ken Manwell as 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice and he was approved at the December General meeting. On the negative side we had a blockage in our sewer system that resulted in a \$5,000.00 dig and repair.

In December Christmas baskets were prepared for all Veterans in retirement homes, thanks to our ladies for coordinating. Also in December we had our Santa parade with a total of 70 floats in the parade and breakfast with Santa were well attended.

January 2019 started with our Levee which was attended by over 200 people filling the Lancaster room. A special presentation was made to the Hospital Foundation for \$26K thanks to the combined efforts of the Kinsmen Club, Rotary club, Ladies Auxiliary and Branch95. That day we welcomed our Deputy Zone Commander Rob Madore and his family, service medals and certificates of appreciation were presented to Branch volunteers.

In General our Branch finances are in good shape.

Our bi weekly fish & chips nights and our Thursday Bingo are the main source of funds for the Branch.

A committee has been formed to bid on the District convention for year 2020. Meetings have been held and subcommittee plans are being prepared.

We wouldn't be able to raise this amount unless it wasn't for our great volunteers and the Town of Carleton Place.

#### Veterans Service

Our Branch Service officer continues to help assist us and our Veterans for assistance. The average used to be approximately 2 to 3 requests for assistance each month. These are for the most part, requests for assistance in filling our Veterans Affairs Canada forms. However, just recently we have had to cancel bringing in Patricia Royle for our Veterans due to lack of interest.

### **Finance**

The Branch finances are doing well; however, I would like to see us make a little more money so that we can continue to improve our old building. Our Finance Committee is constantly looking at ways to save money and spend wisely. As of the first of March we are increasing the prices of our alcohol beverages by approximately .25 / beer, wine glass, cooler, etc. which will bring a domestic beer to \$4.25 which is still minimal compared to other restaurants and bars within Carleton Place. We continue to pay off our loan from RBC. This summer we will also be purchasing another \$7000.00 GIC to invest with helping pay off our loan. This is our second year and we still plan on doing this every year for the next 3 years so that we can pay off our loan early. Things are looking good.

#### Ways and Means

Our Ways and Means committee Chairman recently resigned due to moving away, so this position has been vacant for the last two months. However, a few of us continue to come up with ideas to attract a good and steady turn-out for activities. The monthly Breakfast continue to bring in good crowds and is a very good event. We still continue to have to plan our own Legion events well in advance due to all the rental bookings we are receiving. At the election in April we have a person that will be taking over this position and look forward to the new ideas they bring.

#### **Ladies Auxiliary**

The Ladies Auxiliary are kept very busy lately with various catering functions, fashion shows, craft & bake sales, and the many funerals that they cater among other things. Their sports are self sufficient, supporting themselves with weekly euchre parties, darts, bake sales and sport tournaments. The Ladies Auxiliary has an excellent relationship with the branch and enjoys working together on many projects. The LA continues to help donating funds to help pay with our renovations and upkeep of the building.
