Observation and Comments:

Why are some Branches holding such large amounts of funds in their Poppy accounts? Why not use these funds earlier to support Veteran' and Veteran' approved programs?

Poppy Campaign efforts, comments, and feedback:

 As was noted in my last report, success comes with a good campaign strategy and plan. We must pick our (battles) sitting locations based on traffic (Costco, Major Grocery Stores, ** LCBO **, Walmart, Etc.), train our volunteers, dress for the occasion, use the Cadets, Veterans, Legion Executive Team, get those members out. Of course, this year, all that was not possible.

Through the support of the District Team, Provincial Command should be offering a training workshop on how to organize an effective Poppy Campaign and how to engage volunteers. I was involved with the Legion since 2003, and I have yet to see such training offered.

The Poppy Campaign is a significant revenue source for the Legions, so why not invest in such a train program.

Now an update on the Poppy Trust Report (2019)

The District presented the 2020 Annual Poppy Reporting requirements at the Poppy Chair Seminar Last Fall in Smiths Falls. Branches received the information shortly after; however, there was still confusion from several Branches regarding completing the reports. Many reports continued to be submitted late, incomplete and with information accuracy not to our expectations. What seems to be so simple for some branches is confusing for others. **Recommendations (Some repletion from my last report):**

1. Training MUST be mandatory for all (New and Current) Poppy Chairman, the Branch Treasurer and anyone else involved with pulling numbers together required for the Annual Poppy Reports. Those people that engaged in the training sessions did well. Those that did not attend their results speak for themselves.

2. Annual District Training for Poppy Chairman and support teams needs improvement - Run a formal workshop that will just focus on how to complete the required forms. Possibly use a model Branch as the case study.

3. Branch Annual visits to evaluate Poppy Report should be conducted as a joint event with the annual Branch Audits each year.

4. Branch Presidents should be accountable for the Poppy Financial outcomes and reporting.

5. Branch Poppy Chairman owns the responsibility for the poppy financial reporting process. They ensure that "ALL" the required forms are completed accurately and submitted on time as requested.

6. Branch Treasurer is responsible for supporting the Poppy Chair in completing Poppy financial forms with accurate and complete information.

7. Any questions regarding the completion of these reports should be directed to the Zone Poppy Chairman.

Those Branches that take this reporting seriously do a fantastic job getting the right information together accurately and on time.

I thank all the Branches for their cooperation and support of the Poppy Campaign and their administrative challenges.

The Covid-19 virus has certainly curtailed our revenue stream for the past year but we remain financially stable.

We have had several thousand of dollars in donations given to us from the public and legion members over the past 6 months which certainly helped our bottom line. On Dec.21st we received \$10845.04 from the Veterans Organization Emergency Relief Fund distributed through Dominion Command. We have recently applied for the Ontario Small Business Grant. We are waiting for a reply that should be coming shortly.

Our Ladies Auxiliary along with the Rideau Community Health Services are putting on the Brown Bag Club Lunches for the needy. The ladies have been making and packing (150) lunches two days per week Monday's and Thursday's since Aug. 31st,2020. This has given them the much needed revenue during these difficult times.

We have (235) members in good standing.

Since the last lockdown we have currently reopened the bar lounge on Wed. evening from 6-10 p.m. and on Fri. afternoon's from 1-6 p.m. Also the Lancaster Room is reopened for small bookings of (50) or less people.

Social distancing and wearing of face mask will be followed while inside the Legion as per guidelines from the Leeds, Grenville and Lanark District Health Unit.

It has been an unprecedented year for Branch 174 as I am sure it has been for most branches.

The Provincial shutdowns and the Stay At Home Order has definitely decreased the branch's revenue. Fortunately, with the support of the community and the 'Save Our Legion' campaign spearheaded by Mike Marcil, owner of the local Giant Tiger location, the branch is in a good financial position. The campaign raised over \$60,000 with another \$30,000 in donations directly to the branch. These funds along with both the Federal and Provincial Programs have secured a future for the branch.

We have resumed our Burger sales on Fridays following all the guidelines from Renfrew County District Health Unit. The sales have been consistent week over week. The struggle in finding volunteers is a challenge but we have a wonderful core group that keeps things running.

The branch now has a Pickleball league playing in the hall every Thursday and a group of pool players that have returned. It is great to see these members back and the games room in use again.

Open Mic nights and weekly entertainment were attempted but due to low attendance and the rise in COVID cases in the area, both have been put on pause for now. The lounge is open three days a week.

Our membership is down slightly over last year but this was expected.

The branch remains a respected and active part of our community. We were able to donate over \$3,000 from the Lottery account to local charities over the holiday season.

Membership

Branch # 192 has seen a drop in membership renewals for this year due to COVID-19. Previous year we had 390 members in good standing compared to 294 currently We have also had 16 online enrollments; however, we have had a lot of people say they have had trouble trying to renew their memberships on line.at this time. We have had 1 transfer out due to the person moving and 11 transfers in. Our Membership Chairman has been in touch with Command to coordinate. We will monitor this closely as we are not open as often and this will definitely effect our renewals.

Poppy

Our 2020 Poppy Campaign went very well considering that we didn't have any members promoting our Campaign by standing in front of the different stores / venues we use due to COVID-19. Our average income for the Poppy Campaign brings in between \$25 - 30,000.00. This year we brought in approximately \$32,000.00. A big thanks to our community for their support.

Veterans Service

Our Veterans Service officer has seen and helped 8 Veterans with applications since January.

Finance

The Branch finances are stable. We have cashed in our GICs that we were going to be use to pay off our loan but due to COVID 19 and the unforeseen future, we are now keeping that as a Reserve to pay off bills in case we have to close down again. In January we started our Catch the Ace online lottery partnering back up with the Carleton Place and District Memorial Hospital Foundation and it has taken off with a vengeance. We took our proceeds from our last Catch the Ace Municipal license and put this toward running the online version, placing a starting Jackpot of \$10,000.00. It was a gamble but it did pay off big for us! We are now going into Week 8 and the Jackpot is estimated to be over \$33K with a consolation prize over \$3K. Before Christmas we filled out the application from Command for the money the Government gave to help out Legions across Canada and received just over \$10K. And in February, we applied for the Small Business Grant and received another \$20K from them. So overall, we are doing well.

Ways and Means

We had two take out dinners organized last Fall and had a very good profit made from each. We have not had any other functions due to COVID-19.

Ladies Auxiliary

The Ladies Auxiliary have been pretty quiet due to COVID 19. They have not had any catering functions since the beginning of last March.

Constitution and Bylaws

Nothing to Report.

<u>Sports</u>

In mid February when we were allowed to reopen, we restarted our Ladies Auxiliary Dart League on Tuesdays, the West Dart League on Wednesdays and the Branch Dart League on Thursdays, and all are following the COVID protocols with regard to playing Darts. We will monitor the situation and adjust accordingly. This will definitely help with our Bar sales and overall income for the Branch. Hopefully they can play out the Season.

Overall

Last year we applied to change our Branch name to honour WWI Canadian flying ace Capt. A. Roy Brown, credited with ten aerial victories. He was also credited with shooting down Manfred von Richthofen, also known as the Red Baron. Our Branch name change was approved and we are now known as the, Capt. A. Roy Brown, Branch 192, Carleton Place.

We keep monitoring our finances on a weekly basis. We are very flexible to adjust to the current situation as it changes due to COVID-19. We will make it through this!

Due to the current situation in our area and to prevent the spread of COVID, we have closed our Branch effective 1201hrs, 06 March 2021. We will monitor the situation and advise accordingly.

Good afternoon Comrades. Welcome to our Spring Zone G6 Council Meeting. I hope everyone has enjoyed their winter.

Due to Covid-19 restrictions many functions that were planned for Branch 240 Almonte this past year were cancelled. Since are last meeting at the fall Council Meeting, Branch 240 has been surviving. Thanks to an over \$10,000 donation from the federal government and the more recent \$20,000 grant from the provincial government.

Branch 240 currently has 374 Members for2021 up from 362 in 2020 that is a 103% increase thanks to our Membership Chairman Peggy Byrne.

We took advantage of the Covid shutdown and started a renovation to our upper hall. We started by removing the wood paneling and opening the windows that have been boarded up for years. We found lots of hidden surprises. And because of our generous community who, once they found out we were doing renovations. The donations started coming in. within weeks we had over \$20,000 in donations. Because of this we have decided to do a complete renovation including demolition to original stone walls and removal of all old electrical. We are no on the rebuild stage where we will have new walls, ceiling and floor in main hall. We will also be relocating the upper bar area to make room for an accessible washroom. We are in the finishing stages with the new floor being installed next weekend March 20th. We hope to have the renovations completed by the end of April.

Our catch the ace draw as been switched to a provincial license and completely online. We have partnered with the Almonte general Hospital/Fairview Manor Foundation. Our progressive jackpot is now over \$18,000.

We have recently restarted our Wednesday Wing Night; this will be beneficial to our revenue moving forward. With recent Health Unit restrictions this has been a slow start for in-house dinning, but our takeout service is doing well.

Let all hope we can get back to normal. Stay safe and wear your mask.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all of my comrades in Zone G6 best wishes and congratulations for weathering the Covid 19 storm since we last met. It goes without saying that while we learned some things from the first lockdown we still have a lot to learn going forward when it comes to dealing with this god forsaken pandemic.

Branch 244 has weathered this second storm in pretty good stead. While we had to comply with the second lockdown regulations we took that time of inactivity to get our branch in a good physical state by doing some well needed cleaning and additional disinfecting to prepare for our current re-opening. From a financial prospective, we have been able to upright our financial ship quite well given the fact that we received just under \$11,000 from the federal bailout combined with a \$20,000 grant from the Province of Ontario. In addition, we received a \$14,000 contribution from one family to help us in the repairs to our Cenotaph to be done this spring as well as a number of other smaller but nonetheless generous financial contributions from others in our community. To that end, we are positioned in a very good spot to take on the spring and summer provided we don't have any other lockdowns in the meantime.

Our current membership numbers are not bad considering the Pandemic as we are sitting at 350 members in good standing which represents about 75% renewals from last year. I am confident that those numbers will increase as we get back to business in the coming months. We continue to promote good feelings and support to our local veterans by decorating lawns with Canadian flags on their birthdays for all who are 80 plus. This initiative has been spawned by a very dedicated member (Sue Doran) who also undertook the banner program last fall which saw over 100 banners purchased and hung on our major downtown streets honouring our many veterans leading up to November 11th and beyond. I am told that Sue expects the number of banners to double for this years event. This type of good will towards our Veterans is nothing short of spectacular and is being very well received by our community at large.

In closing, I am very confident that our future is bright what with the vaccination initiative building steam and hopefully seeing a big slowdown to the pandemic with an eventual end in sight. I would also like to thank my 1st Vice President (Bob Day) for stepping in for me over the past few months due to a job change for me that presents very little time for Legion duties. In addition to that I recently have had some serious health issues that are also taking some time to recover from. Bob's enthusiasm in stepping up when needed is proof that our executive ladder works very well when needed.

Catch the Ace at our Legion is progressing slowly due to the closures. The Township of Lanark Highlands has agreed to give us our second lottery license free for another year. We will be using our portion of the proceeds to fix up the Legion hall.

The Ladies Auxiliary of the Lanark Legion is small but remain supportive of the Branch.

The Legion's Executive is small in numbers but remain committed to keeping our Legion 's doors opened and help wherever required. The Branch is a respected organization within the community, and provides support wherever it can within the Village of Lanark.

At this time our total membership is 303. In addition to membership renewals, we have had a number of new members join us during the pandemic and we look forward to their participation.

Our regular branch Election would normally be at our General Meeting to be held on 13 Apr 2021, however at this time, all Branch Elections are suspended and being monitored by Provincial Command as to when they can be held. Our Executive membership has seen little change over the past year and a half, thanks to those that have volunteered to stay on during the pandemic. In order to move forward in a positive way our Executive needs to be refreshed to give our younger members the opportunity to get seriously involved in the Branch operations.
